

We have been very happy with the response to our Facebook Live Streamed worship during the Spring. We not only reached local church family members, but also many from around the world! However, broadcast issues with the live streamed worship stemming from internet connections and other problems necessitated the change to recording the service and loading it to Facebook and our church website after worship concluded. This resolved the broadcast issues, but delayed viewing the worship service by approximately an hour for those of you who rely on this method of worship. We apologize for this delay, but felt delivering a quality broadcast had to take priority.

As our state moved into Coronavirus quarantine stage 4, we began limited in-person worship on July 5. Many safeguards were put in place, including limiting attendees to 50 or less, the requirement of wearing a


mask the entire time of building occupancy, taking temperatures at the door to assure no one has a fever at or above 100.4 degrees, and the addition of hand sanitizing stations at the entry to the church and at the sanctuary doors. Everyone who has attended these services has been very good about following these guidelines, and we will continue to offer in-person worship at 9:00 am each Sunday until further notice.

We also tried a Zoom "virtual coffee hour," which was lightly attended, but enjoyed by all who did participate. We discontinued this practice after the July 19th meeting.

We will continue to offer online communion during Sunday worship. To supplement this effort, a basket containing packages of communion wafers has been placed in the entry to the church. There are 10 wafers in each package, so feel free to take as many packages as you need to celebrate communion with your family for several weeks. The basket will be refilled as needed for as long as needed.

Byron Day for Justice

On Sunday, August 23, a Byron Day for Justice has been organized by United Church of Byron in support of Racial, Food, Educational, Environmental, and Voting Justice. The car procession, escorted by the Byron Police, will begin at 1:30 pm. Prior to departure, starting at 1:00 pm, cars will gather in the parking lot at the United Church



of Byron, 701 W. Second St. There will be barrels available for participants to donate cash, checks or goods to help redress local inequities and injustice as follows:

Racial Justice: There will be a memorial bell ringing and moments of silence.

Food Justice: Donate to People Helping People (cash or check preferred, but canned fruit, spaghetti sauces, tuna, crackers and jelly always needed).

Educational Justice: Donate PPE support to Byron Public Schools (cash or check to Byron Public Schools, or cloth face masks, hand sanitizer and sanitizing wipes).

Environmental Justice: Deposit plastic bags and film to be recycled into a bench for the Byron Public Library.

Voting Justice: Voter registration available at the parade's terminus.

Please practice safe social distancing by wearing masks, staying 6 ft apart when making donations, and keeping in or near your car during the bell-ringing and procession. Contact the United Church of Byron, 815-234-8777, with any questions or for further information.

It's hard to believe that August will soon be upon us. I don't know about you, but ever since the pandemic hit us in full force last March, the days and months seem to feel "off." "What day is today" is a question I've asked and heard others ask as well. Our "normal" routines have changed.



I am glad to have returned to "in-person" worship in July – it has been well received and has gone very smoothly. I am also grateful we have been able to purchase the needed equipment to be able to record and upload our worship services so that those who want to watch the service from home are able to do so.

For many of us, these days of living in the pandemic has brought new challenges to figure out...things we never dreamed we'd have to know how to do or even things we never knew we'd need! For us here at All Saints, that learning curve has included how to first "livestream" the worship service, offer "virtual communion" and now record the worship service. We've also had to figure out ways to come back into "in-person" worship safely. That conversation led to the purchase of a digital thermometer, hand sanitizing stations, face shields and an electrostatic cleaner. My deep gratitude goes to the COVID task force members and our church council for their leadership during this time.

Now the next thing to figure out is what Sunday School and Confirmation will look like this fall. Some ideas are being considered – more will be known as the time nears. We will certainly have information in the September newsletter about this. Perhaps a special mailing will occur as well.

I keep saying this (though I need to be reminded of this as well sometimes!) that despite all the upheaval around us, the one thing that hasn't changed in God's presence throughout all of this. I have marveled at the thoughtful conversations we're having at our Wednesday afternoon Bible study via Zoom. I am so pleased with how many households we're reaching with our online worship services. I am touched to see the quilters continuing their work in making quilts for Lutheran World Relief. All this and more assure me that we are still living out God's plan for this congregation and for our lives. Thank you for walking with me on this journey!

June Council Meeting Highlights

- * Financial giving was strong during this difficult time. Much gratitude was expressed to the congregation for their generosity.
- * Three hand sanitizing stations have been put in place.
- * A task force was formed to discuss requirements for re-opening the church to in-person worship. First in-person meeting will be held June 10 at 7:00 pm.
- * The decision was made to allow small groups such as AA and the quilters to resume meeting with restrictions of wearing masks, physically distancing, and sanitizing furniture at the conclusion of their meetings.

July Council Meeting Highlights

- * During the Coronavirus quarantine, many council meetings were held via Zoom and/or email. The Council Secretary entered into the record all meetings held in this manner, and the result of those meetings for historical purposes.
- * Financial giving remains strong allowing the ability to pass on some of our pledged giving to the Synod and keep our bills up to date. Many thanks to the congregation for their faithfulness.
- * Upgrading the sound system and speakers as well as adding permanent web cameras was discussed. This was sent to a task force formed to determine priority of purchases and cost for future discussion.
- * Sunday School discussions will take place and will be reported at the August Council Meeting.
- * "Beginning a Culture of Generosity" stewardship appeal webinars will begin on August 24. The \$450.00 fee will be covered by the Synod (\$100) a Thrivent Grant (\$250) and \$100 covered by All Saints.
- * There will be a blood drive at All Saints on August 6 from 1:00 pm to 7:00 pm.


